can be found at www.votepinellas.com. There are also two referendums to vote on. One is the Penny for Pinellas vote that will seek approval to extend the 1% sales tax that has been in place since 1990. The funds from this tax, which applies to the first \$5,000 of a single purchase, are used only for long-term capital infrastructure projects in Pinellas County and 24 surrounding communities including St. Petersburg. Additional information can be found at www.pinellascounty.org/penny. There is also a referendum to approve a privately funded one-story parking garage for the Vinoy. The improvements **do not** involve taxpayer funding and will add 270 new parking spaces behind the hotel. The parking garage will be available for hotel guests, attendees of on-site events, people in the community who use The Vinoy's facilities and diners who visit the hotel's restaurants, which are open to the public. As a historic part of downtown St. Petersburg, portions of The Vinoy property are subject to deed restrictions and require approval from the City's residents for construction. The additional parking is expected to help alleviate the shortage of spaces downtown. Additional information can be found at www.VinoyImprovements.com. Be sure to vote on November 7th!

KNOW YOUR COVERAGE

There are many misunderstandings out there about homeowners insurance - misconceptions that can lead to expensive mistakes.

According to a survey by insurance marketplace **InsuranceQuotes**, homeowners tend to overestimate the amount of flood protection they have. Fifty-six percent of respondents still mistakenly believed that a standard homeowners policy covers flood damage. For millennials ages 18 to 36, the percentage rose to 67 percent.

Meanwhile, more than one third of respondents thought auto insurance would cover items stolen from their car, but actually homeowners or renters insurance would cover those.

Most homeowners underestimate their coverage for dog bites: Regarding potential lawsuits filed by someone bitten by a policyholder's dog outside their property, few knew they would be protected by their homeowners policy.

DEAR NEIGHBORS,

In the first six months of last year there were 16 waterfront sales in Broadwater; in the first six months of this year there were 7 waterfront sales. (As of press time, there were 11 sales year-to-date.) This reflects a shortage of inventory rather than a lessening of demand, which is typical overall in the Pinellas County market. There are currently only 5 waterfront homes on the market (and 4 of them are under contract).

In contrast to that, there were 8 non-waterfront sales in the first six months of last year in Broadwater; the first six months of this year there were 9. There are 2 currently on the market (and both are under contract). 🏠

Seawall Contractors

We all know that you should hire a licensed contractor to do any seawall work. Mark Liebel with Duncan Seawall in Sarasota offers an additional recommendation: he suggests you hire a company with a Marine Contractor's state specialty license. Just because a company is a general contractor, that does not necessarily mean that they are familiar with marine construction. Also be sure that they are properly insured - and that the insurance is in their name, not from someone else's company. 🏠

When is a primary not a primary?

One of the big races in the primary this year is for mayor of St. Petersburg. Did you know that if a candidate receives more than 50% of the votes in the primary, that he wins and there is no general election for mayor? So - it's important that you vote in the primary.

Are you away for the summer or on vacation? Absentee ballots or mail ballots cannot be forwarded. You should call the Pinellas County Supervisor of Elections at (727) 464-6108 to arrange for them to send your absentee ballot directly to your summer address, if that's the case. August 23rd is the deadline to request a ballot to be mailed. The primary election is August 29th. 🏠



Taylor Morrison Homes released data recently that more than half (58%) of prospective Millennial homebuyers expect to change where they live over time. 56% of all home buyers share this feeling. Are you in your forever home, or just somewhere along the path?

MARKED APPRECIATION

Realtor.com released data comparing some home features that appreciate differently than others. While homes generally appreciate between 3 and 4 percent each year, there are certain features that create greater appreciation than others. For example, homes smaller than 1,200 sq ft appreciated on average 7.5% a year for the past five years. Larger homes (more than 2,400 sq ft) only rose by 3.8%. Open floor plans appreciate 7.4% a year. Modern and contemporary styles appreciate 7.7% a year. Interesting stuff!

Be Street Safe

As the days are getting shorter and the kids are going back to school, it's a good time to revisit being safe on our streets. First and foremost, we should all follow the speed limits and be courteous to others when driving. Remember that the people you encounter on the street are your neighbors and are also people with families that care about them. Avoid blocking crosswalks and come to a complete stop before making a right turn on red. At 20 mph, 90% of pedestrians will survive a crash, but at 40 mph only 10% of pedestrians will survive. The seconds saved by speeding or driving aggressively are not worth risking someone else's life. By law and for your safety, you should walk on the left side of the street when there are no sidewalks, facing traffic. While pedestrians may have the right of way at intersections and in crosswalks, you should always check twice to ensure that approaching motorists both see you and are going to stop before stepping out into the street. While not required by law, it is a good idea to also wear bright colors and possibly carry a light when walking at night. When bicycling, the most important thing you can do for your safety is to be predictable. Bicycling predictably means: ride in a straight line on the right hand side of the road, signal your turns, and obey traffic signs and signals. Bicycles are legally considered vehicles and you are the safest when you pedal along as a part of traffic. At night, it's also a requirement of the law that your bicycle be outfitted with front white and rear red lights. Go ahead and turn those lights on in flashing mode to be more visible during the day. Hurricane Season and Your Pool

Yes, it is that time of the year again, Hurricane Season. In the newspaper and on television, you will learn how to prepare your family and home for a storm. However, what about your pool? We wanted to offer some simple tips that can help!

Before a storm, remove all patio items (furniture, plants, toys, etc.) to prevent them from becoming projectiles in strong winds. Do NOT throw these items in the pool, as chemicals can damage these items and removal is difficult. If there is a chance the pool motor or other permanently plumbed electrical equipment could be submerged, shut down the power at the breaker panel. Sandbag the equipment if possible.

Shock the pool before the storm (preferably with Liquid Chlorinating Shock), and have extra shock so that you can easily shock the pool after the storm passes. Try to circulate the water as much as possible fore the storm, but leave enough time to turn the pump off at the circuit breakers before the storm hits. Adding a floating chlorinator with tablets is a good idea in case you lose power and cannot run the pump. An extra dose of All in One Algaecide is a good idea as well to further prevent algae. If your pool overflowing from heavy rains is a concern, drain some water from the pool before shutting down the pump. However, don't drain below the bottom of the skimmer.

After the storm, immediately remove branches and other debris that may have gotten in the pool to prevent clogged lines. If you lost power during the storm, remember to reset your circuit breaker and timer when electricity is restored. Empty the pump and skimmer baskets, and return the pool water to its proper level. Clean your filters, shock the pool, and circulate continuously until the water clears.

Bring a water sample to Pinch A Penny to have it analyzed and re-balanced as soon as possible. We do not advise using the pool until you have it tested, because heavy rain will dilute sanitization chemicals and can wreak havoc on the pH which can cause eye and skin irritation.

At this time of the year, we all hope for a quiet hurricane season. However, a severe storm can happen and we must all be prepared. A few simple steps in Pool Preparedness can save a lot of time and money after the storm. We wish you all a wonderful and safe fall season, and call or stop by our store at 4102 34th St S or call 727-866-0464 if you have any questions.

Please remember to turn your irrigation off during wet weather or better yet install a rain sensor

Where the Sidewalk [Literally] Ends

In the spring of 2013 I wrote a pictorial Breeze article (Where the Sidewalk Begins . . .) after my first visit to Clam Bayou Nature Preserve, accessed at the end of 34th Avenue S (off 37th Street S) behind the Wal-Mart/Ceridian area. In the 4 years since that article, a new south side has been built and there is an addition to the north side. Finding an updated map of St. Petersburg's portion of Clam Bayou Preserve was challenging. Phil found a recent photo on Google Earth. He added numbers to the photo that correspond to specific areas mentioned in this article. A 2014 map is at http://www.stpete.org/parks_and_recreation/city_trails/docs/bikemap2014.pdf.

The northern portion (at bottom of the map) has added a small bridge (#1 on map) that leads to a grass-trampled trail winding around to the right until you find a small boat/fishing dock (#2 on map). Although it is tempting to jump in for a quick dip, swimming is discouraged in bayou waters. On our way out we meet up with two bicycle policemen just finishing up their trek through the north trails.



Today is our first visit to the newer south portion of the Preserve and we have no idea what to expect. This south side includes bathrooms, a parking area, a roundabout, a picnic table shelter (all in area #3 on map) and a kayak/canoe launch (#4 on map) (within carrying distance from the roundabout). At the head of the trail we meet a woman peacefully reading her summer novel and eating lunch under the shade of the new picnic shelter. She has come by car to just enjoy her surrounds.



This south portion of the Preserve has been left almost entirely as a natural coastal habitat. Egrets, ibis, osprey and owls greet walkers and bicyclists. Unlike the cement trails on the north side, the trails here are wood and end in natural pine needle underbrush or at picturesque bridges over the marsh/bayou water areas (#5 on map). No concrete here. I would guess 98 percent of the trails are handicap accessible, staying on either the concrete paths in the northern section or the wood trails in this newer section.



The trails continue expanding southward along the bayou, allowing many different directions to explore. One direction leads to an elevated switchback trail (#6 on map) with an observation deck. From atop that deck, a beautiful overview of Boca Ciega Bay awaits you. Today when we reach the top lookout, one gentleman in a dress suit and tie has already taken his place ahead of us on the bench. He is deep in paperwork and thought and so we take our photos and leave quietly.



Today we meet only walkers, of both speed and leisurely varieties. We are the only ones on bicycles. We talk to a "regular." She's here for her daily jog through the Preserve and told us she has made fast friends with the maintenance man and looks forward to his greeting as she enters the parking lot. Another couple we meet is a grandfather with his young granddaughter exploring together.



We ride to the southern-most trail where a very big surprise awaits us. The trail literally ends out over Boca Ciega Bay (#7 on map)! We were not expecting anything so grand. Can't ride any further, but still there is something interesting to see. Looking straight down into the Bay at the end of that bridge, you will see several man-made oyster domes (off area #7 on map). They look like cement donuts. Most likely these were handmade and placed here by Tampa Bay Watch, a non-profit organization that performs a variety of habitat restoration and estuary protection activities throughout Tampa Bay.



The area is officially named the "Ecosystem Restoration and Stormwater Treatment Projects for the Clam Bayou Nature Preserve." Since the 1940s, dredging and filling and stormwater runoff have degraded the bayou. In an effort to improve it, habitat restoration and stormwater treatment projects were built by the Surface Water Improvement and Management (SWIM) Program of the Southwest Florida Water Management District in partnership with the Cities of St. Petersburg and Gulfport and the Florida Department of Environmental Protection.

The projects were done through the cooperation and funds of over 21 local, state, and federal agencies as well as various environmental and civic groups and over 500 volunteers. Clam Bayou Trail connects to the Pinellas Trail in Childs Park, and runs through Clam Bayou and along 37th St. South to the Bayway, where you can connect with the Pinellas Bayway bike routes to Fort De Soto, the beaches, or the Sunshine Skyway Bridge.



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
